
Directions: Roll the die twice to get a pair of things. Then imagine that you could only have one of them for the rest of your life. Which would it be and why?

- “Monkey, tarantula, seagull, weasel. A tarantula is different because it’s the only one that’s poisonous.”
- “Salmon, narwhal, lion, tiger. Hmmm. Two are cats and two live in the sea. Oh, I know! The only one we *eat* is salmon, so it is different.”
